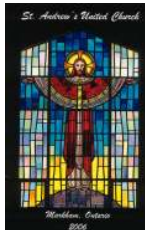

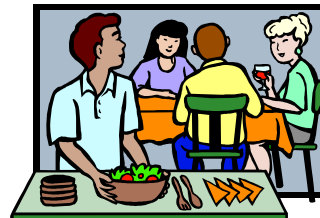

**Thanksgiving** as a holiday, historically speaking, is still quite new. Thanksgiving has only been an annual event in Canada since 1879 when the Canadian government made it so. They were following the example of the United States of America. Fourteen years earlier, President Abraham Lincoln declared Thanksgiving Day to be a yearly holiday. So it's still quite new, at least, compared to Christmas and Easter. But harvest festivals have been celebrated in North America off and on since 1556 when the first governor of Florida enjoyed a happy meal/beach party with the local inhabitants. At any rate, it is now the general custom to celebrate the annual recurrence of that lifesaving/enhancing/enriching marvel we call "harvest." It's a natural thing to celebrate, and it's almost as natural to bring a sense of gratitude to the table.

But this second impulse raises a question. If we're getting together to say "Thanks," who is it that we are saying it to? Some people like to make it perfectly clear that they are not making a religious statement of any kind. They're just thankful. Period. Or they say, "No need to bring religion into it. With the whole family getting together, we have enough to argue about already." Well, really. Is there really any point, or even any sense, in saying "Thanks" when there is no one to say it to?

To many of us, the idea of mailing an unaddressed note of appreciation just won't do! We are too personally involved to keep it so impersonal. So many of us, over the centuries, have gone looking for the appropriate person to thank. But there's no signature at the bottom right hand corner of this painting, so where do we look? One answer to that question is the Bible, which says, "Sing to the LORD with thanksgiving; sing praises to our God who covers the heavens with clouds, who provides rain for the earth, who makes grass to grow on the mountains, who gives to the beast its food." And we say, All right then! It is God that we should thank. And so we do. And this year once again we will, in household groupings all over the city, and also as a church family.

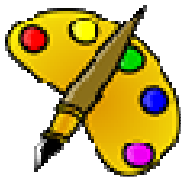
There will be envelopes in the pews on that Sunday as well as the next two Sundays (Oct. 24, & 31) for you to donate to our children.

## **Millions Homeless and Hungry from Pakistan Floods**



In Pakistan, heavy rains have washed away homes, shops and livelihoods. Many people are stranded with no access to food. These difficulties have not garnered the response that one might expect from the global community. The remoteness of many of the affected areas, as well as the flood conditions have prevented the international reporters from gaining access to the stories that tend to motivate potential donors.

The floods have occurred over several weeks in the summer vacation period for Canadians when people are away from the TV and radio. Because we are Christians and United Church members we are called upon to respond as generously as we can. As a result of member donations, \$25,000 was sent to ACT (Action by Churches Together) immediately following the initial news of the crisis. Another \$40,000 was sent in August. ACT members in Pakistan are working to deliver assistance including food, water, tents, kitchen kits, mosquito nets, and emergency medical care. The United Church has also contributed \$75,000 through the Canadian Foodgrains Bank. This will be used for kits providing rice, lentils, flour, oil, sugar, salt, tea and spices.

As part of The United Church's Emergency Response Fund, 85 % of your donation will directly fund an emergency response in Pakistan. 15% will be used to support emergencies that do not receive intense media coverage and response. No administration fees will be deducted from your donation.

This thought comes to my mind as I see Dave Stennick engrossed in operating our audio-visual equipment each week. And this thought is further confirmed as I watch him learning about how to get the most out of our new system. His dedicated work during our worship service every week is truly appreciated and based on what he has said to me, Dave finds it himself to be a joyful experience. Recently, he has learned how to use the system for recording our Sunday service. This is important not only because of our need to have these recordings for shut-ins, but also because we are now able to record all other events that take place in the sanctuary.



Dave is new to Markham, and lives within easy walking distance from our church. He told me that, one day he was walking down Main Street and noticed our sign posted out by the driveway entrance. He had been thinking about coming back to church, having left it when he was a young man. So he checked us out one Sunday and liked what he saw. He has attended church every week since. I asked him what he liked about our church. He said "I like the church community and I really like Reverend Niles. He is a good man and his sermons reach me."

Before moving to Markham, Dave lived in Barrie where he had been since birth. His parents were in Barrie due to his father's enrolment in the Canadian military. Dave has two sisters and one brother. Sadly his parents passed away at a relatively young age and he lost his oldest sister to an aneurism only a few years ago. For thirty years, Dave has worked for Laidlaw (or one of its affiliates), the company that owns and operates a very large fleet of school busses. His role has been in the distribution of repair parts from their central depot in Markham to their maintenance centers located in various Southern-Ontario communities.

In the past, when we at St Andrew's were talking about installing audio-video equipment, I had always been concerned about finding a volunteer to manage the system, someone who attends church regularly, summer, winter, spring, and fall. Dave seems to be our man and judging from the positive comments I have received from members of our congregation, I am not the only one who feels such a strong sense of gratitude. Thanks, Dave!!

## **MARKHAM FOOD BANK**

What do toothpaste and facial tissues have in common? They are two of the most welcomed non-perishable items that are collected by the Markham Food Bank.

Money is needed to purchase things in bulk and to buy some perishable items as well. Food donations also play an important role because they can provide more healthful and higher quality food than bulk buys.

Canned meats and fish and peanut butter are among the most expensive foods --too expensive for food banks to buy in large quantities, but they are high in protein and low in saturated fat. Soups and stews are filling, providing liquid, protein and vegetables. The staples, rice, pasta and cereals are sources of vitamins, minerals, fiber and carbohydrates. Canned fruits and vegetables lose little nutritional value in the canning process making them a healthy choice.

The people requiring help from the Markham Food Bank has increased five-fold over the years. This service is free of charge and is open Tuesday evening, Thursday afternoon and Saturday morning. If you wish to donate money, Mary McLean will take your cash or cheques.

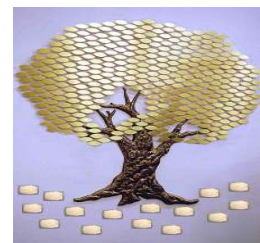

The Property Committee had a very busy summer managing 7 projects through outside contractors to maintain the church building at a cost of \$38,500, funded by the Building Fund and the Faye Greer Fund:

- The largest project was to excavate the front flower bed and water-proof the leaking outside and inside walls of the Choir Room under the Narthex.(shown below) In the process, the contractor broke a water-pipe and flooded the Narthex furnace room but did not damage the furnaces.
- To finish off the Audio/Video project, the ceiling tiles were replaced in the basement corridor.
- The Narthex exterior front was caulked and painted.
- The Youth Centre carpet was replaced.
- Small roof over the south-west door was replaced
- The Sanctuary lights were replaced. (on right)
- With the new furnaces, the two church chimneys are not needed and will be capped off this month to save energy.

# MONEY MATTERS

Welcome back to all the cottage goers! I hope everyone had a beautiful summer!

You may have noticed a number of improvements that the Property Committee has made over the summer including a new room for the Sunday school children, new lights in the Sanctuary, and improvements and repairs to the choir room and in the Narthex among others. It was decided at the June board meeting that these necessary repairs and improvements would be funded from bequests in the Faye Greer Heritage Fund with the intention that any surpluses in the General Operating Fund over the next few years be used to replace this money. As always the Property Committee has done a wonderful job ensure that our church remains a beautiful and comfortable place to worship.

As we approach the fall and move toward the end of the year you may be wondering how your contributions are accumulating. If you are interested in learning where your annual contributions are at, you may contact Nancy at the office during weekdays at 905-294-0351.

I want to remind everyone that you may join PAR (Pre Approved Remittance) to make your monthly contribution to the church at any time during the year. This eliminates missed contributions for weeks when you are away, and ensures that you are reaching your contribution goal without finding that you have a shortfall due to absences when it may not be convenient to increase your contributions.

PAR can be set up quickly by completing the authorization form available in the Narthex and submitting it to Nancy in the office. Much like other pre-authorized payments you may have (your mortgage for example), the amount you choose will be deducted from your account once each month.
